Principal's message

Dear Parents and Guardians,

As we conclude another busy term, I would like to take a moment to thank you for all your support over this past school term and provide some key updates regarding coming events. Firstly, we have outsourced the role of the returning officer for the upcoming board elections. This ensures that the electoral process is managed efficiently and transparently. Schooled has been appointed as the returning officer, and you will soon receive a letter in your mailbox or email with instructions and details regarding the electoral process. Three of our current board members have confirmed their intention to stand for re-election. We encourage all eligible members to participate actively, as we have genuine vacancies on the board that need to be filled.

Additionally, I would like to remind our senior students about study leave for 2025. We have mentioned in assemblies that we will be creating criteria around the allocation of study leave and students will need to have demonstrated progress prior to them being granted study leave. The decisions we make will be based on staff input and achievement data and are designed to support our students' academic success.

The school ball is a significant event taking place on Wednesday 2 July (at 7pm), and we look forward to this annual celebration. Please ensure timely drop-offs and pickups; the doors will close at 8:00pm and the ball will conclude at midnight. Kindly ensure your child is picked up promptly so that staff can also leave in a timely manner. Ellerslie Convention Centre has confirmed a strict pass system for vehicles entering the premises on the evening of the ball. Only one vehicle per attending school student will be able to access the grounds. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated.

Over the term break we have several activities planned, including school production rehearsals and the Tironui Music Programme. These events promise to be enriching experiences for our students.

In term 3 we will also be conducting student progress interviews, offering the option to meet in person, via phone, or Teams/Zoom/etc. This flexibility aims to accommodate everyone's preferences and schedules.

Lastly, there will be changes to the Year 9 timetable starting next term to accommodate the changeover of our half year courses. Students will have receive their updated timetable on the last day of term. You can also check the KAMAR portal for timetable information

I wish everyone a restful term break and look forward to seeing you all back, safe and sound, ready to tackle the challenges of the new term.



ATTENDANCE


Our latest school-wide attendance data shows that 52% of students are regularly attending school, which means they're here more than 90% of the time - this is a great effort and something to be proud of!



With us being a trial school for the STAR (Stepped Attendance Response) program, it's great to see that more than half of our Year 9, 10, and 11 students are regularly attending school, with 54–56% attending over 90% of the time. This shows strong engagement from our junior students - KA PAI!

Please continue to report your child's absences to our School Office. If your child will be travelling during the school term, you will need to write a letter to the principal stating the dates your child will be away and the reason for the travel. For appointments during school hours, please contact the school before you pick up your child or send your child in with a note.
