

## **ATTENDANCE**

Our attendance data shows that just over half of our students have been regularly attending school each term, with 53% in Terms 1 and 2, and 51% in Term 3. While regular attendance has stayed steady, there has been a slight increase in chronic absence in Term 3 (18% compared to 15% in Term 2 and 10% in Term 1).




It's great to see that over half of our students are maintaining strong attendance—let's keep building on this momentum and work together to help more students reach that 90%+ target. We are more than half way through Term 3 and every day at school counts!

Let's looks closely at our five year groups:

Over half of our Year 9, 10, and 11 students are regularly attending school (above 90% attendance), with Year 10 leading at 57%. While senior attendance is slightly lower, with 48% of Year 12s and 44% of Year 13s attending regularly, please encourage your senior students to attend school as we also have the preliminary exams taking place Week 8 - 9 this term.

Please check your email inbox for our mid term attendance letter. We encourage all parents and caregivers to also check the Parent Portal once or twice a week to keep track of their child's attendance. Please contact your child's form teacher if you notice any unexplained absences, and remember that all absences must be reported to the school.

### STUDENTS SHINE AT AI HACKATHON!

On August 12 and 13, our team proudly represented PaS at the 2025 AI Hackathon, organised by AI Forun NZ. We were the only high school participants at the event, surrounded by industry professionals and university students with far more experience in artificial intelligence. At first, it was daunting, but with encouragement and support, we found our footing and learned to work shoulder to shoulder with the professionals.

In under 48 hours, our team developed MemoryEcho – a program that uses AI to help people preserve, organise, and revisit memories through rich, intergenerational storytelling. The journey was packed with challenges, last-minute problem-solving, and rapid learning. We were tasked with developing the front end using Vercel.

Our pitch for MemoryEcho struck a chord with the audience, winning the People's Choice Award. More than the award, we came away with new skills, newfound confidence, and the realisation that we can thrive in a professional environment. We are grateful to the Digital Department and Ms Jayawardena for making this unforgettable experience possible and encouraging us to take part. IS YOUR SORE THROAT STREP THROAT?

Strep Throat is caused by the Group A Streptococcus (GAS) bacteria.

If left untreated it can lead to rheumatic fever and possibly rheumatic heart disease.

Rheumatic fever rates are most prevalent amongst Māori and Pasifika populations. People aged 3-35 years living in the North Island are most at risk.



## Why Does It Matter?

Sometimes the body's immune reaction to fight off the GAS infection can cause an <u>inflammatory response</u> within the body that can cause <u>lasting damage to the heart.</u>

## Rheumatic Fever Signs & Symptoms

If Strep Throat is left untreated you may develop:

- Sore & swollen or hot joints
- Jerky movements
- Fevers that lasts a few days
- Stomach pains
- Extreme tiredness
- Weight loss
- Unusual looking rashes

## Rheumatic Heart Disease

The inflammation caused by rheumatic fever can scar the heart valves. This can cause permanent damage to the heart.

This is <u>rheumatic heart disease</u>.

The risk of damage increases more with each presentation of rheumatic fever but can also result from the first episode.

Importantly, <u>rheumatic fever is preventable.</u>
